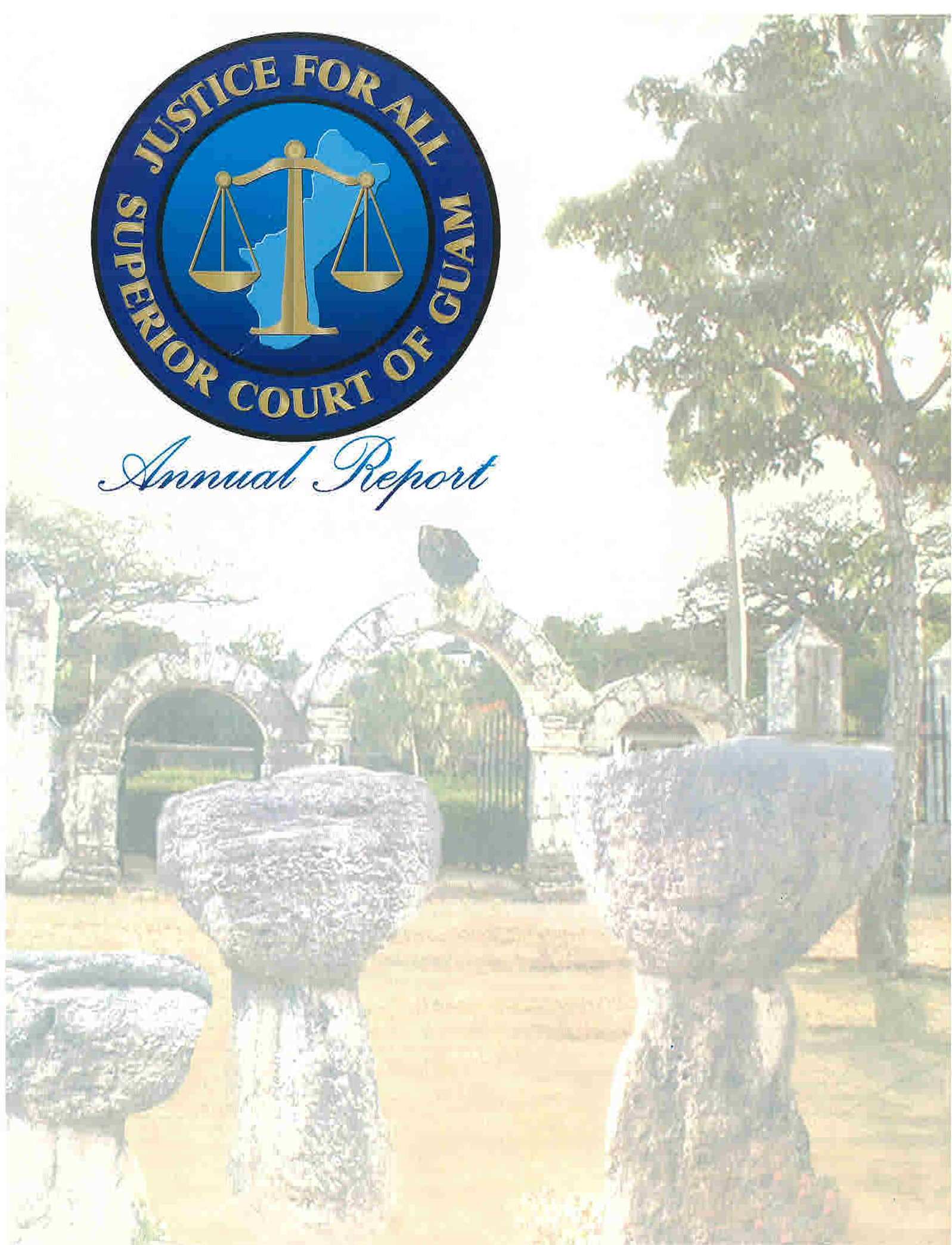

Message from the Presiding Judge

We have compiled this booklet as a comprehensive review describing some of the accomplishments, anticipated projects and goals of the **Superior Court of Guam**.

It continues to be the goal of each Judge to provide every resident of this community with a fair and expedient decision in all legal matters brought before this court, and our dedicated employees continue to work diligently, upholding the highest standards expected from our Courts.

The **Family Violence Court** that we implemented, drug testing of clientele, the development of a drug education program and assignment of all drug cases to one Judge has created the framework for a **Drug Court on Guam**. In addition, we have a pilot program for electronic monitoring of pre-trial clients. The court now has it's own web page and the public can view the daily court calendar on the Internet. We have also standardized forms for **Temporary Restraining Orders** which assist us to efficiently and effectively protect the residents of our community.

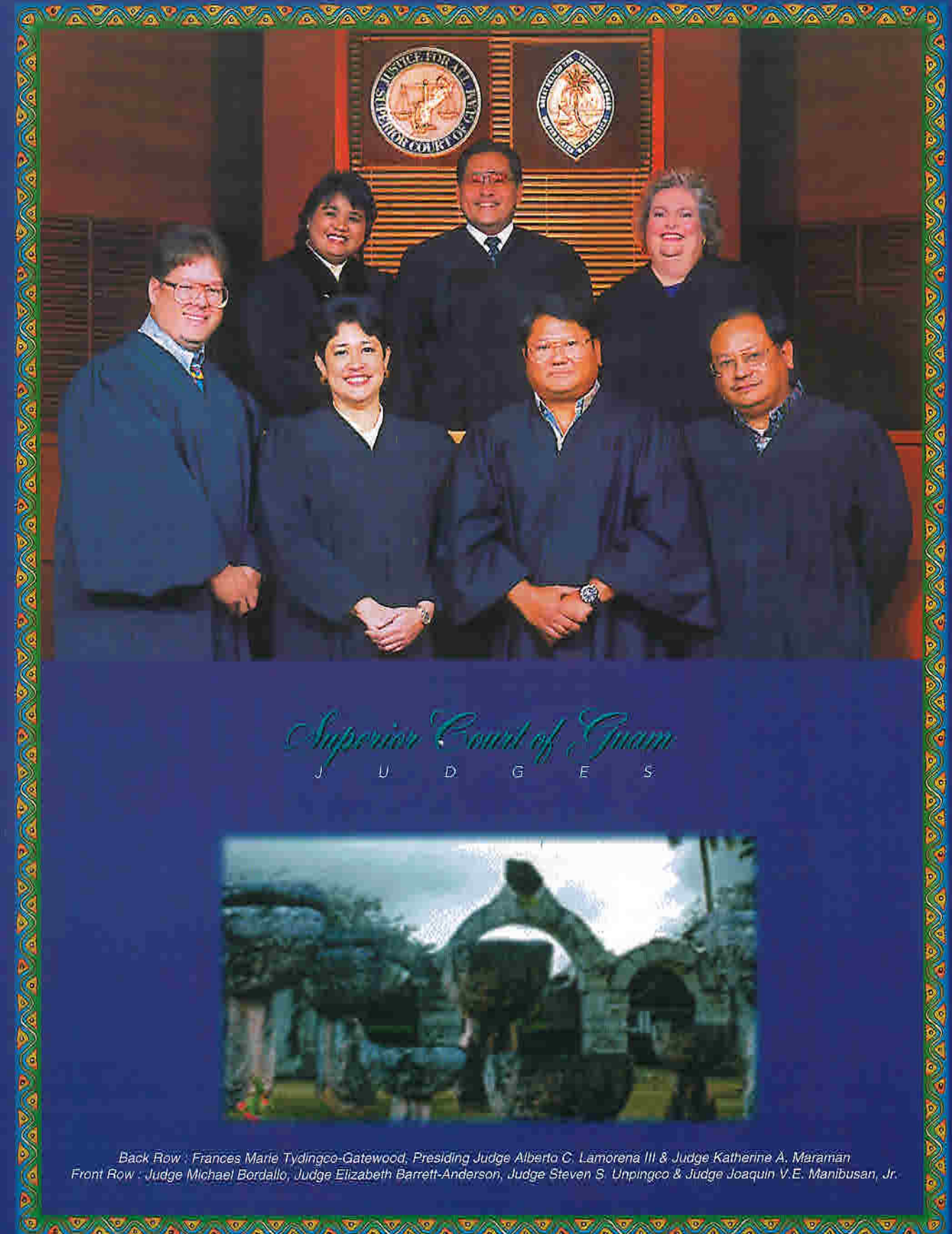
We established the first ever **Criminal Justice Information System** to serve as a central electronic repository of records. Today, this allows local law enforcement agencies to assist each other in the vast criminal justice arena from the initial stages of apprehension and arrest, pre-trial and confinement, to monitoring while on probation or parole utilizing the most up-to-date computer equipment available.

I am happy to report that not only have we developed and implemented this project, but, that this automated program has been so successful that federal law enforcement agencies have requested to actively participate and gain on-line access to the **Justice Wide Area Network (JWAN)**.

In the pages that follow you will see how this very system affects the work activity not just within the courts, but also provides positive integration with other agencies who must work hand in hand with the court on a daily basis.

In the spirit of our ancestors we will share the burden of the concerns expressed by this community. We pledge to work together to reach new goals, and truly be proud of this island that we call home.

Deputy Administrative Director

The Office of the Deputy Administrative Director oversees and manages the Guam Judicial Center operations, facilities and properties, federal grants, court automation, capital improvement projects, renovations, acquisition of equipment and supplies, contracts, proposals, and the Judicial Building Fund with the assistance of the Management Information System Division, the Special Projects Coordinator's Office, and the Procurement and Facilities Management Division.

Prior to accepting the position of Deputy Director of the Courts, Mr. Cruz was responsible for implementing the Superior Court's **Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS)** and establishing the **Justice Wide Area Network (JWAN)**, in which more than \$3.5 million federal dollars (FY92-FY98) were awarded to the Court for this major undertaking by the U.S. Department of Justice.

The CJIS and JWAN provides comprehensive Criminal History Records Information (CHRI) on a twenty-four (24) hour basis to all local and federal law enforcement agencies accessing the Court's Central Database Repository. These integrated systems paved the way for the Guam Police Department to arrest 1,400 individuals from November 1997 through November 1999 based on Warrants of Arrest information posted in the CJIS.

In light of the federal program's success, the Deputy Director's Office was able to expand Court Automation efforts to all Courtrooms, Judges Chambers and Divisions, thus enabling the Court to meet industry standards by acquiring a Windows 95® NT-based system environment. The expansion project included implementation of enhanced software ("knowledge-based") customized by Superior Court managers and personnel to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of court processes and services to the public.

The CJIS enables a Police Officer, a Marshal, or other law enforcement officers to electronically review a person's 'criminal rap sheet', e.g., prior history, current charges and any outstanding warrants of arrest in felony, misdemeanor, traffic and child support cases. This ensures that Judges and Prosecutors have complete, timely and accurate information on a real-time basis of persons with a criminal history background. Public safety has been taken to the higher level through automation thereby increasing the protection of people on our highways and in the communities that we serve.

Deputy Director Robert Cruz addresses the Council of Womens' Clubs of Guam. For the first time the community was introduced to CJIS, & the Womens' Council was chosen since it is the umbrella organization of all womens' groups on Guam, & statistics reflect that more women are reported as victims in all reported crimes associated with Family Violence.

Mr. Cruz explained how CJIS allows peace officers responding to a domestic disturbance to verify if a restraining order or stay away order is mandated by the Courts. Future plans include implementation of a digital mapping system with the capability to locate & identify where any offender convicted of criminal sexual conduct is residing upon release from incarceration. By law, convicted offenders must now register upon release from incarceration. The Superior Court will be maintain registration files and updating of digital mapping and tracking system.

In addition, the Deputy Director's Office is currently involved in three major capital improvement projects funded by the Judicial Building Fund: construction of the 8th Courtroom to be tentatively completed by April 1999, paving of Esperanza Street for additional public parking, and the replacement of the air-conditioning system with "state of the art" **Direct Digital Control (DDC)** system software for the Guam Judicial Center. The Guam Judicial Center will acquire this advanced air-conditioning software (DDC) in order to substantially decrease power consumption and ultimately costs.

The Deputy Director's Office has established "**Public Access**" pursuant to P.L. 24-301, introduced by Senator John C. Salas, Chairman, Committee on Judiciary, Public Safety, Consumer Protection, and Human Resources Development, 24th Guam Legislature. This statute aided in the improvement of court services for the People of Guam by implementing an **Automated Court Calendar** available on the **Justice Web Page** via the Internet (www.justice.gov.gu), enabling all persons to print the court calendar and

standardized court forms for civil and domestic protective and/or restraining orders. This allows attorneys, both public and private, to print these forms from their offices for expedient filing. This was the impetus to create a **Domestic Registry**.

Future automation projects include the establishment of a **digital photo imaging system** (criminal mugshots), Department of Motor Vehicle photo interface for CJIS, Global Information System for criminal land mapping, Guam's **Sex Offender Registry** (Internet-based for public access), and connectivity to the FBI's **National Crime Information Center (NCIC)**.

The Domestic Registry is an accessible, on-line sub-database containing information of all persons with civil or domestic court-ordered conditions. The Registry is for law enforcement purposes and is available on a twenty-four (24) hour basis through CJIS. This common-user interface allows officers to not only concentrate on criminal backgrounds but also to enforce civil and domestic restraining orders that wouldn't ordinarily be available through CJIS ... which increases investigative and case continuity.

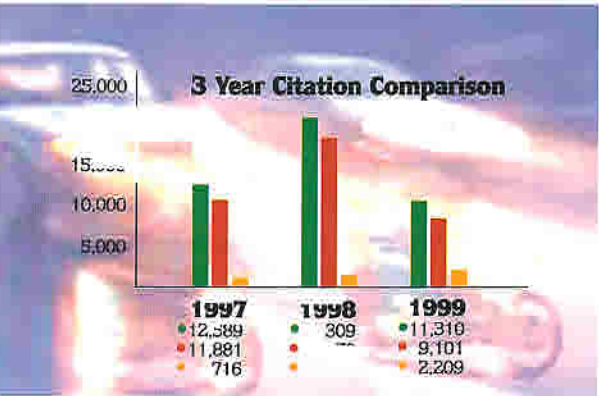

Court Reporters Unit

The Court Reporters Unit is the sole transcription and tape archival unit for the Superior Court of Guam. It is staffed by seven (7) transcribers.

In addition to providing verbatim transcription records of court proceedings, six (6) court transcribers also record grand jury sessions. The Grand Jury convenes four times per week and on the average hear six (6) cases per day when scheduled by the Prosecutor's Office.

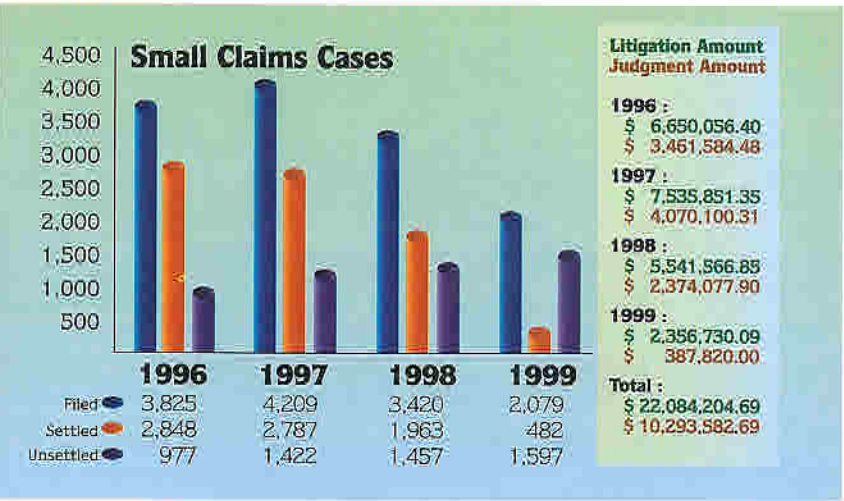
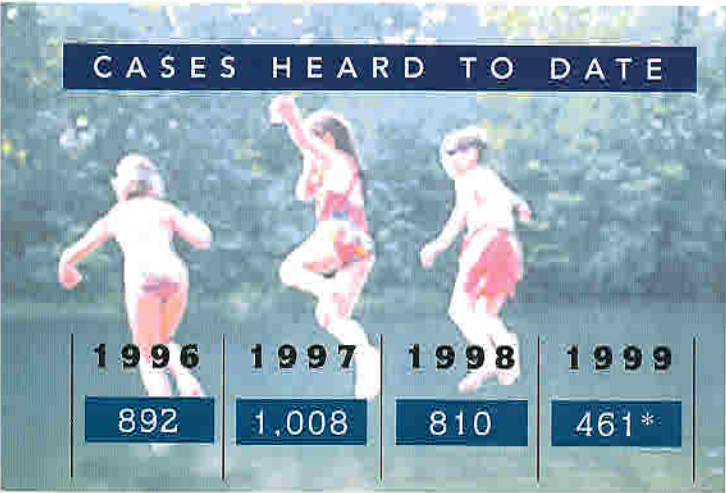
In instances where either attorneys or court patrons request for immediate transcription of captioned proceedings and the request cannot be filled within 24 hours, then a tape is duplicated ("dubbed") at a cost of \$10.00 per tape. The Unit is income generating, a fee of \$2.00 is assessed for each transcribed page.

Workload for this unit is measured by the number or volumes of pages transcribed. The chart below reflects the overwhelming number of pages officially certified as verbatim transcripts. In survey taken by the Guam Bar Association, 75% of practicing attorneys who completed the survey indicated that had not experienced any problems with the services being provided by the Court Reporters Unit.

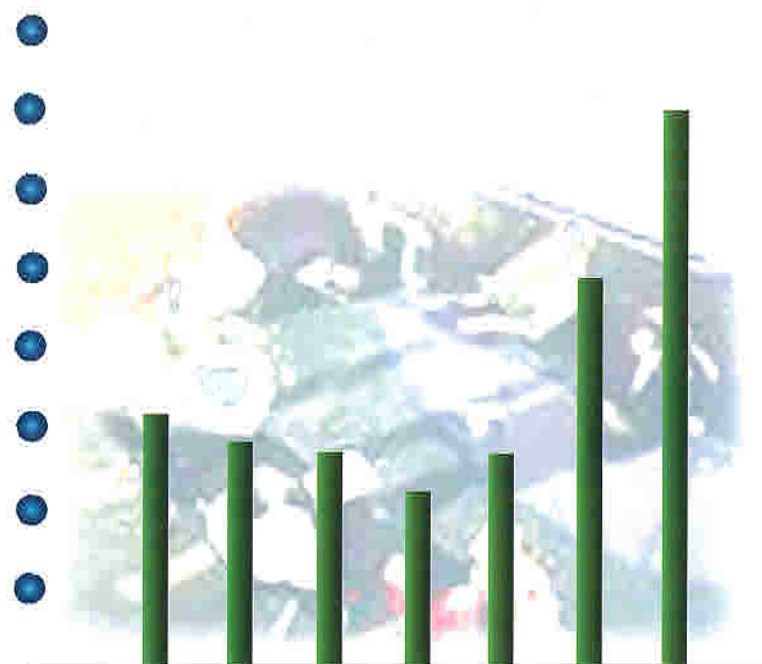

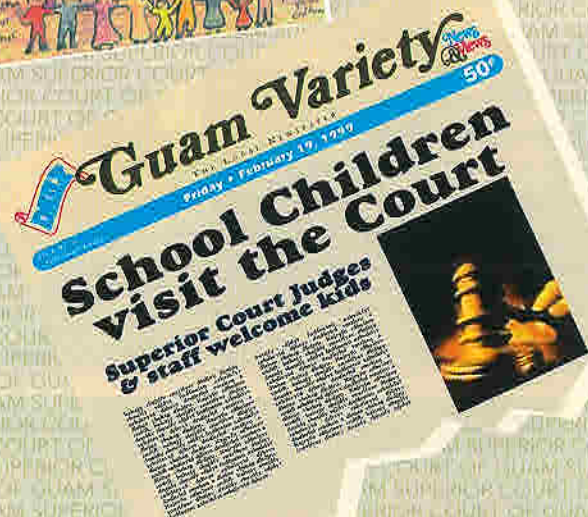
